
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Background


- In 1995, SIDS was identified as an increasing problem amongst Pacific migrants in NZ
- This stimulated a response
- This presentation is about the Auckland response.

Confirming the Problem

A research project confirmed the increased SIDS numbers:

(Fuamatu et al: NZ Med J 2000:113)

- Consultation with Pacific child health workers to assess knowledge of SIDS (Cowan, et al: 1996)
- Formulate a work plan
- Acquisition of resources to solve the problem

The Solutions

- Train Community SIDS Educators (CSE)
- To ensure culturally appropriate strategies
- To develop community ownership of the problem
- Enable the Pacificans to empower themselves to deal with the problem
- To enhance cultural safety of the health workers and the Pacificans, respectively

Why the Community SIDS Educators (CSE)?

- They live with and know the community
- Respected and established in the community
- Understands and speaks the language
- A community leader

The Training Strategy

- Phase 1 Primary Objective- SIDS knowledge
- Expected outcome Plan and conduct community educations SIDS session
- Phase 2 Focused on training techniques, planning of session and use of teaching aids
- Phase 3 Focused on the CSE, reversing their trainee role to that of trainer
- Phase 4 Remedial, continuing education, update and catch up
- Practical Sessions

CSE in Action!

- Organize SIDS awareness and education sessions
- Teach SIDS prevention and healthy lifestyle
- Conduct radio SIDS interviews of experts in the vernacular
- Collect SIDS information e.g. census & evaluation
- Refer to appropriate services

Competencies

- Understands the culture
- Able to do presentation
- Ability to write report
- Fluent in English and a Pacific language
- Preferably computer literate
- Willing to work after hours for nominal fee

Basis for Pacific SIDS Prevention

Pacific culture informs us that:

- Family is the basis for changes among Pacificans
- There is a need for ethnic specific approaches to services for Pacificans
- Promote behavioral changes which are socially acceptable

Pacific and Western Core Values

Pacifics:

- Cooperation
- Consensus
- Respect
- Generosity
- Loyalty
- Sharing
- Humility
- Reconciliation
- Fulfillment of mutual obligations
- Reciprocity=Relationships

Western:

- Individual rights and freedom
- Independence
- Justice= equality and access
- Privacy
- Competition
- Consumerism
- Scientific-rational = Individual well being

Creating a culture of prevention

- Addressing the needs of the community not just one aspect of it, such as SIDS, alcoholism, unemployment, etc.
- Identifying what communities value and build on those
- Encourage communities to tell their own stories and take charge of them.

Addressing the root causes

- SIDS is but a symptoms of things going wrong in our communities
- There is no better way of destroying a community than by undermining its values and beliefs systems
- To effectively address SIDS in Pacific societies, we must mend the broken socio-cultural ills in our communities.
- We can do this by strengthening their values and building strong relationships.

Lessons ... Learned

- Motivated and respectable ethnic specific CSE
- Inadequate ethnic specific information for SIDS prevention
- Decrease in SIDS incidence among Pacificans
- The use of CSE enhanced community participation
- High attrition of the CSE mechanism developed to address this

Lessons ... Learned

- Pacific SIDS Prevention by Pacificans for Pacificans
- Collaboration with Maori SIDS Team and other Pacific agencies
- The importance of insider Pacific staff – enhanced the program and construct ethnic specific service provision
- Cultural safety and support
- Development of a Pacific Model

Future: Develop Pacificans First Projects

- To create a culture of safety at home
- To provide prevention at setting where people live, play and die
- To improve access to service and entitlements
- To Grow our own:
- Ethnic specific services
- Pacificans for Pacificans first

Future Directions

- Reduce Pacific SIDS- A national Pacific Child Health Programe needed
- Build on our achievements to date
- CSEs' have made a difference, we need more resources
- Take a leadership role -undertake our own research
- Review research, evidence and messages to ensure appropriate for Pacificans e.g bed sharing
- Address socio-economic determinants of health for Pacificans
