<p>Māori experiences of rehabilitation from major trauma</p> <p>Sharon Pihema, project lead shared an update on this work:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Pae Ora as outlined in He Korowai Oranga is the guiding framework for this project. - The aim is to understand the care and rehabilitation experiences of Māori major trauma patients and their whānau. Using findings to develop a clear articulation of the gaps and opportunities for improvement. - This project involves interviews with whānau at 6 DHBs across NZ. <p>More information here.</p>	<p>1. <p>Patient reported outcomes</p> <p>Siobhan Isles shared an update on this work:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Commission has contracted the University of Otago to conduct phone interviews with patients to better understand self-reported outcomes and recovery post discharge (function, relationships, work etc). - This work is modelled from the Victoria State Trauma System, allowing us to benchmark and assess recovery at 6, 12 and 24 months. <p>included, however there may be scope to do this in future to get a more robust/meaning view as advised by this group.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Interview instruments used are the World Health Organization Disability Assessment Schedule (WHODAS) and EuroQol Research Foundation (EQ-5D-5L). <p>More information here.</p>	
<p>Update on data work</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Data analysis underway with ACC data, preparing this for the learning session in March. - Initial data match with Australasian Rehabilitation Outcomes Centre (AROC) is underway. 	
<p>Update on Collaborative planning</p> <p>Project teams: <i>Applications closed 12 February</i>. We have 6 applications received to date. Pending a few others.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Active+ and ABI: Mapping referral pathways for trauma patients requiring rehabilitation services. - Active+ and ABI: Concussion screening for all major trauma patients (ref to AUT brain injury screening tool). - Northland DHB: Evaluating the issues for major trauma patients transitioning from acute setting to community care. - Auckland DHB: Improve neurosurgery communication pathway for moderate TBI patients. - Midcentral DHB: Development of clinical guidelines for trauma patients. - Southern DHB: Te ara marama, improving transitions to the community for Māori TBI patients. <p>Next steps:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Follow up support for remaining project teams who have not submitted their forms. - Learning session 1 scheduled for 30 March 2021, planned as an in-person workshop in Wellington. - The programme for the learning session will cover: consumer co-design, model for improvement, measurement for improvement, and presentations by guest speakers (Dr Andrew Phillips, his work here). <p>Mitigations/actions taken on the groups feedback raised: Te Ao Māori is not set at the forefront of the project as intended.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Current mitigations: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> o Encourage projects that target issues important to Māori, Māori rep on each project team, link with local Māori GMs and rehab provider services. o Informal advisers: Anaru Fraser, Alexis Cameron o Ensure collaborative project teams target issues important to Māori o Require Māori rep on each project team o Link with local Māori GMs.
